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INCLUSIVE STRATEGY CARRIES XI XI TO STUDENT BODY PRESIDENCY

That lumpy old couch, on which Xi Xi Nathan Willett '18 and his vice president, Tri Delta Payton Englert are perched, personifies the winning strategy that carried the duo to a record win at MU. Nathan and Payton received 8,548 votes, 17 percent more than the previous record. "Voting in a campus election is not a primary consideration for most college students," Nathan said.

So, how did they get there? How did they energize so many at MU?

Since Greeks are one of the largest student segments, opponents easily claim a segmented bias when representatives of fraternities and sororities run for office. Nathan and Payton didn't let that happen. Most importantly, their campaign message, "Tigers Together," was reflective of their vision for MU's future. It was a lot more than words.

They started with a mature and senior-heavy campaign staff, and, as most campaigns need cash, Xi Xi alumni stepped forward to offer strong financial support. The heart of the candidates' beliefs was that many campus elements could be unified through a student government not bogged down by the past but focused on the forward. Going forward meant a new togetherness.

Nathan and Payton are great sales people for our university. They have strong respect for the MU experience, both in education and total quality of student life. This enthusiasm permeated through their communication.

Now for the lumpy old couch. They set the remnant up in the shadow of the columns, and for two weeks, they hosted open conversations with any student who would sit with them while enjoying, as Nathan avers, some fine coffee. The discussions were broad-reaching, the comments sometimes emotional, but they showed this team would be there for everyone. It was an exclamation point to their message, and it worked!

There were a few bumps in the campaign road, some thrown by their opposition, but Nathan and Payton navigated them smoothly. They, with their cabinet and student senate, will set the direction of the university for the next year. Nathan considers himself the chief advocate for all students. He and Payton want to see a campus that moves together as a unit and puts past differences away.

It is interesting how their objectives coincide with those of the Interfraternity Council and chapter presidents. It's biting off a lot, but if enthusiasm and focus can make a difference, it will abound in Nathan and Payton's administration.

By the way, they did have a campaign bonus. They were supported by Harpo's. With that kind of help, how could you lose?

Recent Problems Generate Strength for the Greek System and Xi Xi

f you live anywhere within normal media reach of our campus, you have seen the publicity regarding the fates of two Mizzou fraternities, one charged with severe hazing and the other allegedly involved in a race-based interlude. Even though no blame was found in the latter incident, previous problems with the involved chapter motivated its removal from campus by its national organization. The hazing house also met the same fate.

Fraternities must live with an emphasis on the negative behavior and frequent medial neglect of the good things they do. It's frustrating but a fact of life. For instance, in the past four years, the Alpha Epsilon Pi Rock-a-Thon has raised more than \$400,000 to fight cancer. Our Chapter, from the Sigma Chi vs. Beta hockey game and Derby Days, raised \$38,000 in one semester. All the funds raised went toward fighting the same disease. When the Beta chef's wife became seriously ill, the Chapter supported her with a \$5,000 donation. Trent Grimshaw, a Delta Tau Delta, flew to Washington, D.C., to donate bone marrow to help a woman with blood cancer when they were matched. This spring, Xi Xi alumnus Alex Lindley '15 will meet his fundraising goal of \$250,000 to produce a film on suicide problems in college. His group, Project Wake Up, also plans to contribute to mental health support at MU. These cases represent just a sampling of the positive efforts of the men and women of the Mizzou Greek system.

THE NATURAL AND RATHER UNNATURAL REACTION

It's only natural that the university amplifies communication with and pressure on the officers of Greek organizations, increasing the scrutiny of their chapters after events and trying to cull occurrences negatively impacting the image on the campus. Though the oversight has increased, the response by the Greek community may surprise you. Instead of reacting with a "poor us" attitude, both the Interfraternity Council and individual chapter officers decided it was time to take positive strides forward.

The IFC recognized the damage to general fraternity unity resulting from flimsily grudges and overreaction to healthy competition. It has set out to change that culture and to improve interaction through better social contact; particularly reaching out to historically African-American fraternities. We at Xi Xi previously attempted the latter but found due to our large membership, we tended to overwhelm the smaller numbers of those organizations. IFC,

in recognizing this disparity, has encouraged contact among officer groups of the chapters to equalize the numbers.

Although hazing, due to our "no freshmen in the Chapter House" policy and the newly instituted pledge program, is virtually a nonissue at Xi Xi, the encouragement of pledges to perform acts which infringe on the privacy and property of other chapters has been a divisive issue in terms of achieving Greek unity. IFC is emphasizing stoppage of this. Special efforts are being made to educate freshmen about the right way of acting.

A RETURN TO FORMER DISCIPLINARY PROCESSES

During the time that the two chapters were being expelled, the disciplinary process had been tightened. Xi Xi had been a prominent actor in altering the previous rules; when any charges were brought against a chapter, it would be given two weeks to investigate, report its findings, and indicate any discipline exacted. When the negative publicity hit the fan, the process was tightened. Now, due to the positive steps being taken, the original system appears reinstalled. Most importantly, a stronger bond among fraternities has been created from their common purpose. The immediate future promises a healthier position for our Greek system, consistently recognized as one of the most vibrant in the nation.

WHAT'S THE STATUS OF XI XI?

Our Chapter's current picture has to be weighed against our unique positions on freshmen and our pledge program. You may remember we initiated 41 out of 41 pledges in the fall and have a spring semester class of 15. Our consul reports, with an expected degree of bias, that pledging Sigma Chi is highly coveted among potential new members, and we cannot take all the good men who would like to join us. In-house problems have been minimized, and a growing respect and care for the Chapter House is noticed.

Nathan Willett '18, receiving heavy support from a number of other fraternities and sororities, is the new student body president, and the Chapter is readying for another dazzling and successful Derby Days. Folks, that's called momentum.

One can surmise that out of the ashes of negative publicity, the Greek system and our Chapter have never been stronger and more united

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Scholarship Award Criteria:

1. We model our scholarship program after the Latin Honors program that is widely understood by undergraduates at MU and many other universities around the country. Latin Honors at MU consists of three levels defined by specific GPA achievements:

Summa cum laude: 3.9 and aboveMagna cum laude: 3.7-3.899

• Cum laude: 3.5-3.699

\$30,000 is the maximum payout. Individual awards are figured on a pro rata basis (summa = \$1,000, magna = \$750, cum laude = \$250-\$300 depending on remaining funds available).

- 2. Special Awards
 - Ike Skelton Outstanding Junior Award: \$500
 - Shields/Tidd Outstanding Sophmore Leadership Award: Engraved Watch
 - Outstanding Freshman Award: Mother's Board

Chapter Eternal

Kent Knopinski '63 entered Chapter Eternal on January 19 after a long battle with lung cancer. During the Vietnam War, he was in the Army Reserves. He married Joanna in 1964, and they had a daughter, Ashley Dru. After the birth of their daughter, they relocated to Los Angeles, where Kent began his career at Pierose Building Maintenance Company in Beverly Hills, Calif. In 1970, their second child, Jason, was born. Kent rose within the ranks of the building services industry to become the president of Bekins Building Maintenance Co. He became a leader in this industry and was a key partner in several large mergers. In 2004, Kent retired. He and his second wife, Judi, relocated to Carmel Valley, Calif. In 2007, he became Vice President of Glastonbury Inc., based in Sand City, Calif. Kent enjoyed

traveling to Europe and playing golf with his friends in Carmel Valley. He enjoyed spending time with Judi, dining out with friends, and planning the next family vacation. He also adored his cats; he would walk them daily and they liked to ride in the car with him. Kent will be remembered for his warm wit, honest nature, and his unwavering loyalty to his friends.

Robert L. Jackson Jr. '64 of Shawnee Mission, Kan., entered Chapter Eternal on November 18, 2016, at the age of 74. He received his J.D. from the University of Missouri in 1966. He was senior partner at Rose, Jackson, Brouillette, and Shapiro. He then became vice president of J.C. Nichols Real Estate. In 1997, he formed Great Plains Developments.
